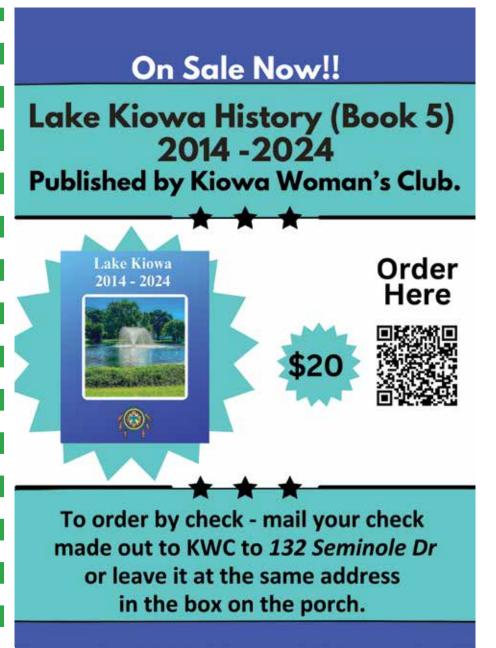

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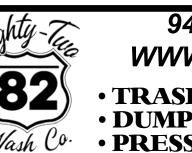

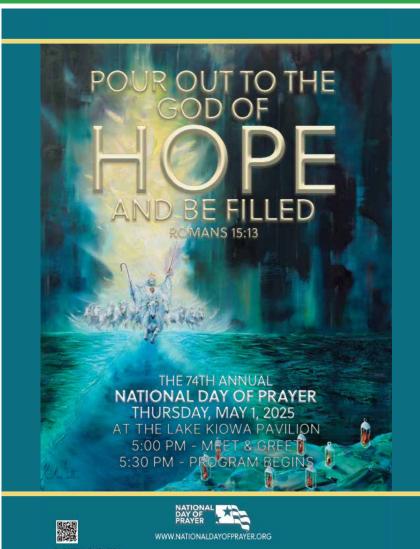
About Saint Jo Riding Club, Inc.

#### Flag Etiquette: Respecting Our Nation's Symbol

We have received many questions recently about the proper etiquette for displaying and caring for the American flag. As a symbol of our nation's history, sacrifice, and freedom, it is important to handle it with respect and honor

Below are a few key guidelines to ensure the proper care and display of our flag:

Displaying the Flag

The U.S. flag should always be higher than other flags when flown with state, local, or organizational flags.

When displayed against a wall, the union (stars) should be in the upper left corner.

The flag should never be draped over a vehicle, podium, or table-instead, it should be displayed on a pole or properly folded.

Handling the Flag

The flag should never touch the ground or any object below it.

When carrying a flag in a parade, it should be held high and free flowing.

**Flag Retirement** 

A flag that is worn, torn, or faded should be retired in a dignified manner, typically through burning in a special ceremony. Post 265 offers a flag retirement service for those needing to dispose of their flags properly.

When to Fly at Half-Staff The flag is flown at halfstaff as a sign of mourning on Memorial Day (until noon) and by presidential or local government order.

Illumination at Night

The flag may be flown 24/7, but if displayed at night, it must be illuminated.

Our flag represents the freedom and sacrifices of countless Americans. Let's ensure we honor it with the respect it deserves.

New Program: Uber Health and VHA Partnership

Attention veterans! A new transportation program is now available through Uber Health and the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) to assist eligible veterans in getting to their VA medical appointments. Eligibility for Uber Health Rides

To qualify, veterans must be Beneficiary Travel (BT) eligible, which includes:

Veterans with a service-connected (SC) disability rating of 30% or more.

Traveling to/from treatment of a service-connected condition.

Receiving a VA pension.

Income does not exceed the maximum annual VA pension rate.

**Program Requirements** 

Veterans must be BT eligible.

Veterans must be ambulatory and able to get in/out of the vehicle unassisted.

Veterans must be traveling for a VA-scheduled appointment.

A VA common carrier consult must be in the veteran's medical record, confirming a valid need for transportation assistance.

A VA employee must enter the Uber Health ride request for tracking and monitoring purposes.

This program ensures that veterans have reliable transportation to and from their VA medical care.

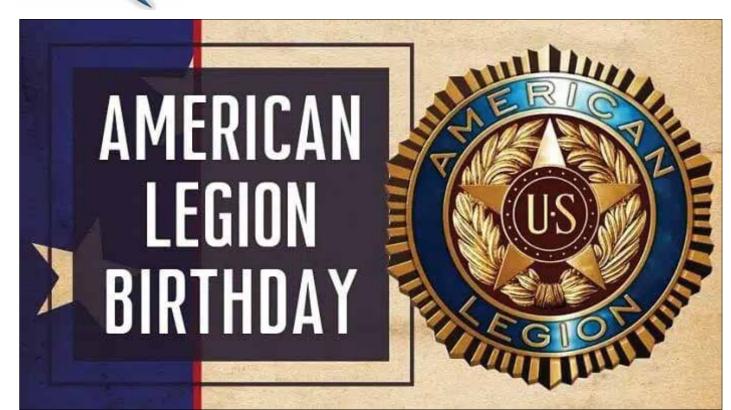

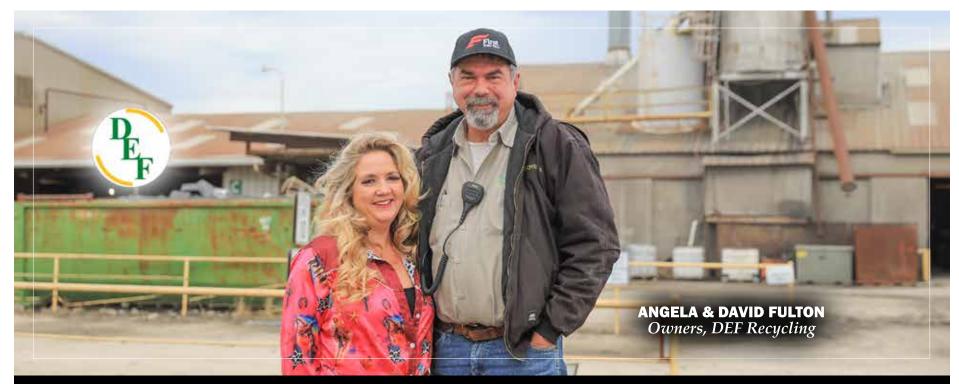












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# Lake Kiowa Anglers & Conservation Club

Boat Registration Decals (2025)

If you are renewing registration, you will need to bring proof of insurance and the number on the red rectangular Lake Kiowa sticker on your boat to the POA office.

If you are registering a boat for the first time, you'll need to bring both proof of insurance and proof of ownership.

Boat owners are required to re-register their boats each year and display the current year decal.

3.3.6.1 - \*\* Watercraft Registration All watercraft other than manually



Not all those who wander are lost – some are just fishing

powered watercraft under 20' (Kayaks, canoes, row boats, surf boards, paddle boats, etc.) in length must be registered with the POA. Registration decals EXPIRE on the last day of the calendar year indicated by the decal. Lot numbers in contrasting three-inch or larger numbers are required to be displayed on all watercraft regardless of size or type (aft port and aft starboard sides of all boats).

All Kiowa home/lot owners also should have received a paper copy of this in their January POA bill.

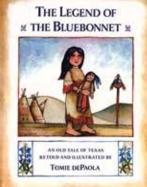
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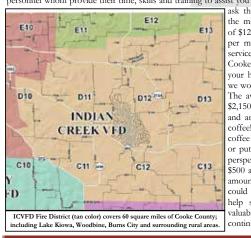
### **CREEK VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT**



The Indian Creek Volunteer Fire Department (ICVFD) is once again launching its annual fundraising campaign. The monetary donations collected will assist in purchasing the necessary equipment needed for both the fire and medical services that we provide. Not known to many, ICVFD is completely its own entity, and is not tax funded like many other city and volunteer fire departments; we are a 501(c)3 non-profit funded like many other city and volunteer fire departments; we are a 501(2) non-profit corporation (EIN 46-0904546). Your tax-deductible donations assist with our overhead operation costs including utilities, fuel, training, and setting aside funds to replace aging fire trucks and equipment. Though we have a fire station in the Lake Kiowa community, we operate completely separate from the HOA and have to secure our own funding in order to provide the services that you rely on every day, 24/7. Without your donations, our 911 emergency response services would not exist!

Since our inception in 2012, ICVFD complies with the Cooke County Commissioner Court's fire department audit, and in return, receives approximately \$25k to assist with funding our services. That's "all we get". With our average annual operations budget of \$95,000, and an annual \$85,000 equipment Replacement-Fund goal (\$180,000 combined), we rely heavily on individual donations, business donations, grants, and fundraising events to provide the balance of the funds needed for our 911 medical and fire services.

As a COMPLETELY volunteer fire company, with dedicated PROFESSIONAL personnel whom provide their time, skills and training to assist you in your time of need...we



ask that you please contribute the minium annual donatio of \$125 (that's a little over \$10 DID YOU KNOW. per month), to help keep our services as one of the best in Cooke County. If you feel it in your heart to contribute more, we would obviously be grateful! The average household spends \$2,150/yr on cell phone service, and an average of \$750/yr on coffee! Will cell phones or coffee potentially save your life or put out a fire? Putting it in perspective, \$100, \$250 or even \$500 a year is a relatively small amount for the impact that we could provide. If everyone can help share the cost for this valuable organization, we can continue to help others

These dedicated volunteers have chosen to live in the ICVFD fire district, and continue to serve their commun ity on their days off. At present, we currently have (4) Dallas Fire Rescue, (1) Plano Fire Rescue (1) Irving FD, and (1) The Colony FD firefighters who respond to incidents; often taking precious time away from their families to assist friends and strangers. ICVFD also has dedicated EMT/Paramedics that work at Cooke County EMS and Sacred Cross EMS; along with several others that have chosen to become certified in the medical or fire fields. Any of these experienced folks may help you during your time of need...but what's lso great is that they help train our new volunteers whom may have no experience at all. It's a WIN-WIN!

#### **ICVFD Medical Response** ✻ At your door in a moment's notice!!

DID YOU KNOW ..... that only 7 fire departments in Cooke County provide 911 first-response for medical emergencies? Indian Creek, Gainesville, Valley View, Callisburg, Muenster, Lindsay, and Moss Lake fire departments are the only fire departments authorized to respond to medical emergencies Over one-third of the county has to wait for 1 of the 5 nearest county-funded ambulances to arrive for medical care; yes...there are only 5 ambulances in the entire county, and depending on how busy they are, it could take 10-20+ minutes for them to arrive! Providing medical first-response service is not a requirement of any volunteer fire department...but from day one, Indian Creek chose to take on this complicated task to provide quick, increased level of medical care for our friends, family

and district residents. This requires additional paperwork, licensing, thousands of dollars worth of equipment, and countless hours of training. Over the last year, on average, ICVFD medical personnel were on scene within 6-8 minutes from the time the initial 911 call was placed; oftentimes sooner. With a 60 square mile fire district, and no paid personnel sitting at a fire station, that's quite impressive for ANY medical response entity! On top of that, we responded to 99.6% of every call dispatched; an estimated 20% more than most other VFDs!

Currently, 92% of our ICVFD firefighters are EMTs or Paramedics. These dedicated volunteers are trained and certified with the same knowledge that is required to be employed by many DFW fire departments and ambulance services. When you call 911 for a medical emergency, our first responders will arrive with knowledge and equipment to provide basic life support care until the Cooke County EMS ambulance arrives with additional capabilities and assistance with patient transport. Many of our medical responders are equipped with \$2500-worth of medical equipment, allowing them to be at your house within minutes of your call. This OPTIONAL medical service is not easy, nor is it cheap...but Indian Creek VFD strives to provide the best for its district residents!

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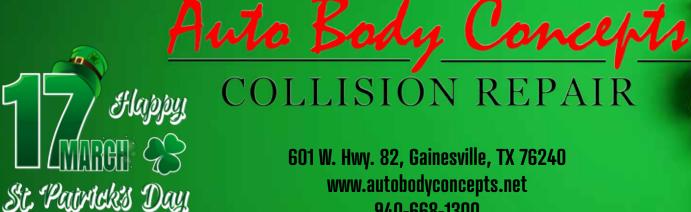

Over the past couple of months, the MGA Board of Directors has been reviewing the MGA bylaws to bring them up to date with current practices. The changes identified were a change to the check writing signature policy and changes to bring the guidelines for inputting scores to the GHIN handicap system up to date. Per the bylaws, Jim presented these changes to the membership in this meeting so that they can be submitted for an approval vote at the March meeting.

The MGA Board has been making a strong push to encourage members to help to maintain the condition of the golf course. Jim expressed that especially during the winter when it is cart path only and the grass on the fairways is dormant, it is very important for the players to carry their sand bottles with them and fill multiple divots as they walk to and from their ball. It is also very important for the players to try to fix multiple ball marks on the greens.

Steve Ruffino was presented with a plaque for his hole-in-one in December. His hole-in-one was on #13 from 130 yards with a 5-hybrid. In 2024, Steve accomplished the extremely rare feat of two hole-in-ones in the same year.

Tournament director Mike Erickson discussed the Spring Kicker Tournament which is coming up March 14-16. The Spring Kicker is a 72-team, 2-man tournament with tee times starting at 8:00 AM each morning. The Saturday format will be a scramble, and the Sunday format will be a shamble. The Friday evening event will include pari-mutuel betting and a dinner for the players. Signups will be accepted from February 15 through 5:00 PM March 1.

The format of the February play day was the format originally

planned for January, Rotor's Revenge in Reverse, to counter the Rotor's Revenge December format where everything was set up as tough as possible. #### Did You Know...

That there's a maximum hole score for handicap purposes and different ways to determine that maximum? There's actual gross score, net double bogey, par plus 5 strokes, most likely score, and net par. Let's look at each.

First is your actual gross score (the actual number of strokes it took you to hole out from the tee). We recommend keeping score hole-by-hole for yourself and your playing partners using the GHIN app because the app will automatically adjust your hole score to the maximum allowed for handicap purposes. If you don't post hole-by-hole and only post your total gross score to GHIN, then you are responsible for adjusting each hole to the maximum allowed for handicap purposes, as discussed below, and posting this adjusted gross total to GHIN.

A hole is considered to have been played if it has been started so your hole score for unfinished holes is your most likely score or net double bogey. Until a player has played a minimum of 54 holes and established a Handicap Index, the maximum score for each hole played is limited to par plus 5 strokes. Once a player has established a Handicap Index, the maximum score for handicap purposes is your most likely score or net double bogey whichever is less. The USGA offers the following guidance for most likely score: If on the green and no more than 5 feet add one stroke. Between 5 feet and 20 yards add two or three additional strokes, and if more than 20 yards add three or four additional strokes, depending on ball position, green difficulty, and player ability. Net double bogey is par + 2 strokes + any handicap strokes that the player receives on that hole. For example, on a par 5 where the player receives two handicap strokes, the maximum score for handicap purposes is 9, (5 + 2 + 2).

If a hole is not played for some reason, then your score for handicap purposes is net par which is par for the hole plus any handicap strokes you're allowed on that hole. For example, if the 9<sup>th</sup> is closed for maintenance and you receive a stroke there, your score for handicap purposes is 5.

Remember, if you post hole-by-hole in GHIN, GHIN will adjust each hole to the maximum for handicap purposes. If you post total score, then the player must adjust each hole to these maximums and post an adjusted gross score. Not only are these maximums required for handicap purposes, but you can also use them to improve your pace of play by picking up and moving on once you've reached your maximum score. Particularly if the players behind you are waiting. Questions? Ask any member of...

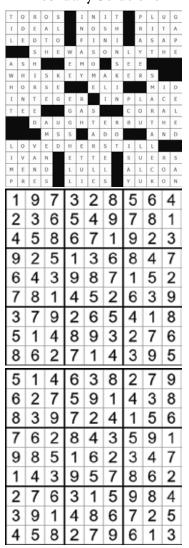

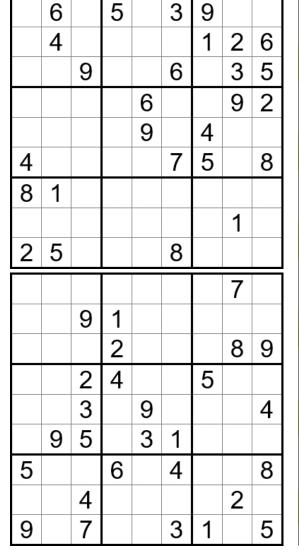

### Golf Course Maintenance Report

Every year around the first week of February, the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America (GCSAA) holds its annual Golf Industry Show and Education Conference. This is a great event that features two days of education seminars followed by a two-day trade show. It is a great time to catch up with colleagues from around the country and maybe pick up some things that I can use here. It is also a great place to learn from turf experts who share their research and to find out what is new in the industry. Then, you get to meet all the turf vendors and see all the new shiny equipment they are launching for this year. In a way, the Golf Industry Show kicks off the new golf season. It is a great way to recharge your batteries and get excited about the upcoming growing season. This event is something I look forward to every February. This year the event was held in San Diego. I enjoyed my time in California, but I am happy to be back in the great state of Texas!

In early February, we finished up what I like to call our Spring pre-emergent herbicide spray. This is when we make a wall-to-wall application of a combination of pre-emergent herbicides and a non-selective herbicide. The pre-emergent herbicides are designed to control and prevent germination of summer annual weeds, and the non-selective herbicide is in the tank to clean up any weeds that germinated after our fall pre-emergent herbicide application.

March is what I consider to be the start of our season. This is when the grass starts to break dormancy, and we get back into more of our routine maintenance schedule.

Please continue to fill your divots and repair your ball marks.

### **Security Report** *Rule of the month*

3.3.2.1 - \*\*Posted Speed Limit

The speed limit for all vehicles within the Association community is 25 mph or lower if posted or if warranted by road conditions such as traffic, weather, impediments or obstructions, repairs or construction, or anything else that would require a prudent driver to exercise caution.

*Reminder: Guest and Delivery Driver Responsibility in Lake Kiowa* 

Per Rule 3.3.1.27 – Responsibility / Admission / Authorization, members are responsible for any guest they invite, including Uber, Door-Dash, Walmart, Instacart, Home Depot, friends, and other visitors. This means if a guest or delivery driver speeds, damages property, or drives the wrong way, the member is held accountable.

When using delivery services, please take a moment to remind your driver that the speed limit in Lake Kiowa is 25 mph. Security is also reinforcing this by notifying drivers of the speed limit before opening the gate.

I understand this may not be a popular rule, but on Lake Kiowa's private roadways, it is our only means of reducing speeding. If a delivery driver is pulled over for speeding, Security will now contact the homeowner so they can immediately reach out to the delivery company.

Youth Golf Cart Safety Course

The season for power boating activities is right around the corner and I want us to get out in front of it and be prepared. Take the time to reeducate yourself, your family members, and educate all of your new guests on all aspects of these rules. Ignorance of any of our rules or procedures is not a valid excuse, as they are posted online and available at the POA office. I suggest you ensure there is a copy on your watercraft at all times and each operator reviews it before leaving your dock each time. The Lake Kiowa Boating Safety Test (LKBST) is ready to go. Every watercraft operator, regardless of their age, is required to take the LKBST. This is a requirement that was implemented in 2016 and is educational and easy to achieve on your own timeframe. I strongly suggest that each and every watercraft operator re-take this test each year to keep his or her knowledge completely up to speed. Everyone born after January 1, 1993, is also required to take and complete the Texas Water Safety Training course and provide Proof of Course Completion of that course in addition to the LKBST while boating on Lake Kiowa. The Texas certification is consistent with what is required on all public lakes in the state. There was a good deal of thought and effort put into placement of buoys on the lake in an effort to direct boaters to safe operating practices and to alert them of possible hazards.

Numerous buoys were placed in high traffic locations to guide boats, skiers, tubers, etc. to stay at least 50 feet away from these potential hazards. "Ski-in, Ski-out" (SISO) buoys mean that watercraft under power can

### Message from your POA Office...

Technology seems to be all around us. There is an "app" for everything, and a website or a Google inquiry to find out any information. I know some of us have embraced this more than others.

I know this is not for everyone, but did you know you can receive your statement via email? We sent out 960 statements through the USPS last month. With the rising cost of the stamp, this cost the POA members approximately \$571. We have 502 people that receive their statement in paper form. However, we have 458 members that are receiving their statements electronically and in paper form. If we switched the people that are receiving their statement both ways to electronically only, this would save the POA approximately \$300 each month, which amounts to about \$3,600 a year.

Kendall gets calls from members about getting their statements late each month via USPS. We run statements on the first business day of the month, and the

pull a skier or tuber straight out of a properly designated cove and into the main body of water and merge into the correct traffic pattern and continue to tow the person behind the watercraft. That skier (or tuber) can also be towed back into a SISO cove and "dropped" by the towing watercraft, provided the watercraft does not make a sharp (>90 degree) turn under power. These areas are generally greater than five feet in depth and at least 200 feet across from front-of-dock to front-ofdock. Areas greater than eight feet in depth and more than 250 feet across generally allow skiers to turn. "No Wake" buoys mean that all powered watercrafts must be idling along at the slowest speed that allows the watercraft to maintain course - less than five mph. All coves have these areas in the farthest reaches to allow for boat deceleration and to minimize wake energy. Both beaches have buoys - large and small ones - to cordon off the swim areas and to designate the "landing zones" where PWC, canoes, or kayak users can idle (SLOWLY) into these zones and beach their watercraft and use the beach facilities. Our Security Team will be on the water when there is high activity. The boat will be visible and spend more time directly interacting with boaters. Have your certifications, insurance cards, Personal Flotation Devices (PFD), and fire extinguishers' handy to show our officers when requested. Please feel free to contact Chief Melanie Cade with any questions or suggestions on lake safety.

All you need to do is email your request for electronic statements to *office@lkpoa.org*, and we can set it up for you. Did you know you can also pay your bill electronically? With our new system, you can now pay your bill online using your bank account or credit card; there is a fee for using your credit card. This would save you time and postage mailing the payment back to the POA office. Just know that you must pay your member account and your property account separately. When you log in to your account, you should see a member tab and a tab with your property address. If you don't, call us, and we can look in our system to check that everything is set up for this ability.

Rule of the Month

3.3.3. - \* Private Property Use

Any trade or activity, including but not limited to garage or estate sales, that causes an increase in traffic or a nuisance in any part of the community is not permitted on any lot. Yard sales are prohibited. Garage and estate sales are only allowed if:

a permit valid for three consecutive days is obtained from LKPOA office by the member at whose residence the garage or estate sale is to be held; the fee set by the LKPOA is paid;

all items offered for sale are kept indoors at the member's residence; and

all items are sold only to Lake Kiowa members, employees, sponsored guests, and contractors who are authorized to be in the Lake Kiowa community on the date of the sale.

Garage and estate sales shall not be advertised to anyone other than a Lake Kiowa member or employee. Permits are limited to two (2) in any calendar year, unless otherwise determined by the Community Manager. The Community Manager may revoke a permit for a violation of this rule, in addition to any other penalty allowed for a violation.

Animal	Control	Report
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Spring has arrived in Lake Kiowa, bringing an increase in wildlife activity as many critters emerge from hibernation in search of food. While spotting these animals can be exciting, it's important to remember that some may pose risks. Please avoid approaching them and be aware of the following signs that may indicate their presence near your home.

Common Signs of Raccoons, Opossums, and Armadillos

Noises at Night

Scratching, shuffling, or scurrying sounds in walls or attics.

Unpleasant Odors

Opossums produce strong-smelling waste, and raccoons may leave urine or droppings with foul odor.

Property Damage

Raccoons can damage gutters, soffits, fascia, and insulation. Opossums may knock over garbage cans.

Tree Damage

Raccoons may break branches or strip bark while searching for food or nesting.

Scattered Garbage

Raccoons are notorious for rummaging through trash.

Missing Pet Food

Outdoor pet food can attract raccoons.

Unusual Pet Behavior

Pets often detect wildlife before humans do. Doors Left Ajar

Raccoons have been known to nudge doors open.

What To Do If You Suspect Wildlife Near Your Home

If you believe you have unwanted raccoons, opossums, or armadillos on your property, please contact Lake Kiowa Security for assistance by calling 940-665-3221. We have a limited number of traps available, or we can guide you on where to purchase one. If you successfully trap an animal, security will relocate it upon request.

For larger wildlife concerns, you may need professional wildlife removal services, which can be found online.

River Otters in Lake Kiowa

Lake Kiowa is also home to river otters, which can be aggressive during mating season and while protecting their young. They typically arrive in March and stay until June. Please keep your distance if you encounter one.

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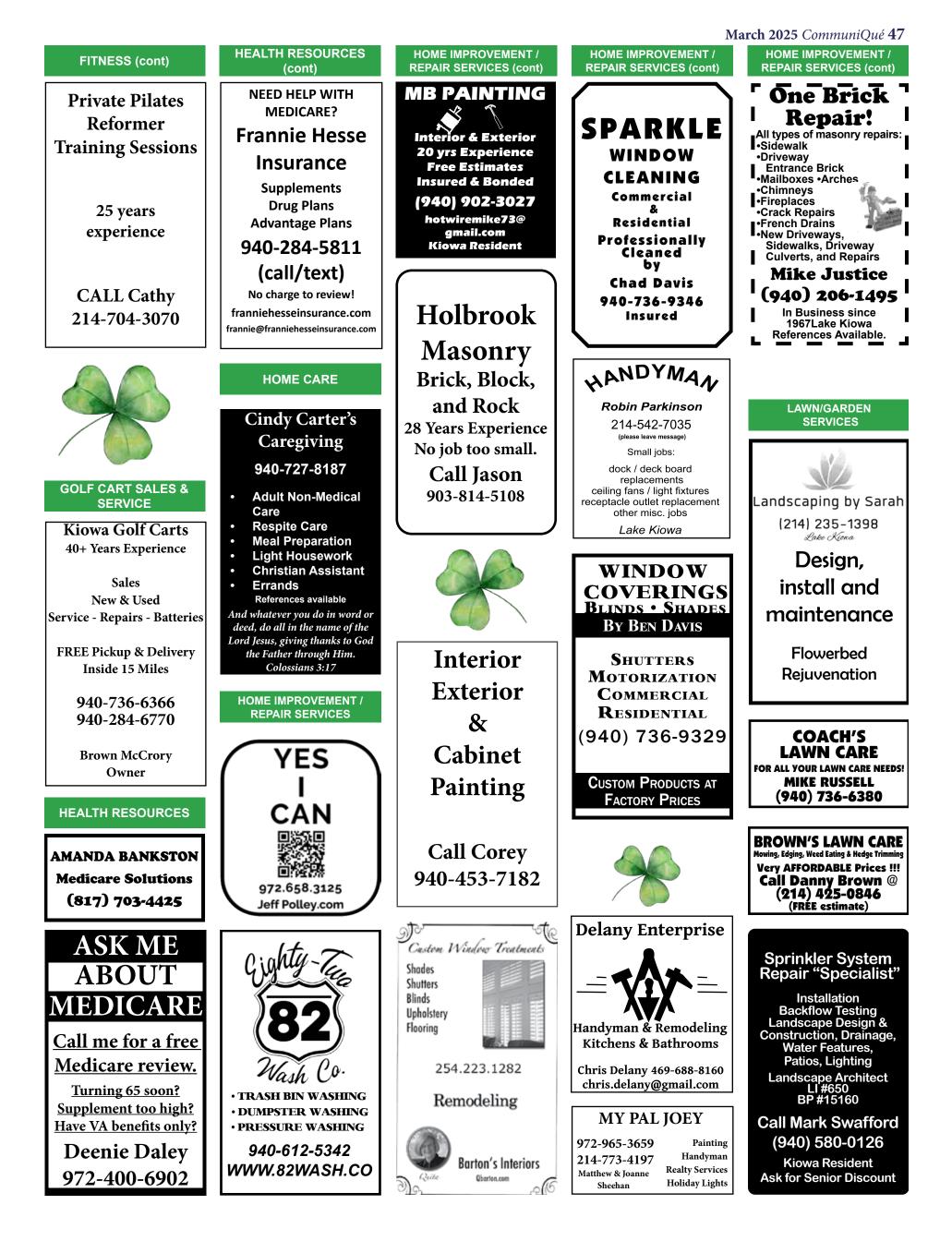
